

Longneck Manor is also currently home to three Southern White rhinos (*Ceratotherium simum simum*), which is a subspecies of the white rhinoceros (*Ceratotherium simum*). Justin, Barney, and Fred are our three 6-year-old rhinos!

From the recent data collection in 2023, the International Rhino Foundation released values sourced from the IUCN Red List, that estimated that there are less than 30,000 rhinos left in the world. Southern White rhinos are facing many threats, most of which include poaching for their keratinous horn, as well as habitat loss, disease, civil unrest, and possibly war in some instances.

Why Rhinos? Southern White rhinos are a keystone species, which means they are quite important for the environment's survival! This means that the Southern White rhino's population impacts the local communities. From an environmental perspective, a keystone species is defined as "a species on which other species in an ecosystem largely depend, such that if it were removed the ecosystem would change drastically". The landscapes can change at any given time based on the weather, but over time rhinocerous grazing patterns can also diversify plant life and create grazing opportunities for other species. This can be achieved through their stature and behaviors... as our boys are very tactile, you can imagine how they might impact vegetation! Once classified as "pachyderms" or very large mammals with thick skin, scientists and researchers have found that their closest living relative is usually found on a farm!

What is Longneck Manor doing to help rhinos in their natural habitat? At the forefront, Longneck Manor is a place for connections to take place between people and our animal ambassadors. We will work to inspire our guests to conserve through the relationships they build with our rhinos. From those awe-inspiring moments, we not only hope to create future conservationists, but to create action for rhinos in need.
